

For those who don't know where that was, it was located in Pelican Street, but in line of sight down Gooloi Street (Poinciana Avenue), just to the left of where the front door of the Council building is now. The article was suitably titled. I hope you also see the lighter side of life in Tewantin in the early 1900s

A "Plate" of Oysters!

While fishing at the mouth of the river Noosa seven years ago a resident of Tewantin lost a dental plate to which were attached six or seven artificial teeth (writes a correspondent). While laughing (probably at the everlasting fish joke), the teeth fell into deep water. Diving and dredging failed to recover the plate at the time, and the owner ruefully said a long and last farewell to the teeth. But during this new year holiday, while groping for fragments of rock with oysters on them, the long lost teeth came to light. When seen by the present writer this week the plate was on exhibition in Ede's store, Tewantin. The discovery aroused no little interest.

Four or five small oysters - some dead, others alive - were clinging to the vulcanite plate while six or seven gleaming teeth lured among the ragged oyster shells.

All Noosa community volunteers are welcome to attend the event. Attendees are advised to bring a picnic blanket or a chair.








Did you know?

THREE IN ONE TREE

Three trees growing in very close proximity to each other, and some have declared sharing the same root system, were a landmark in Diyan Street, Tewantin for many decades. The three trees were located on the Eastern side of the Royal Mail Hotel and in what is now the garden behind Parkyn's Hut. The photograph on the right, taken Ca. 1971, shows the sheer size of the tree(s) when compared to the man standing on the roadway beneath it.



The Three-In-One Tree, when compared to the big Fig Tree opposite the Post Office, easily equalled it's diameter, and significantly beat it's height.

A large Forest Red Gum (Eucalyptus tereticornis), also known as a Blue Gum or Red Iron Gum¹, formed the central column and host for a Small-leaved Fig (Ficus Obliqua), but it has also been described as a Moreton Bay Fig and a Strangler Fig, while a Tuckeroo (Cupaniopsus anacardiodes) grew hard up against it.

Unfortunately, the tree(s) became stressed and suffered continual dieback, and after assessment by independent Arborists, it was declared "nearly dead" and "dangerous"². In February 2016, the Noosa Shire Council declared that the Fig and the Tuckeroo were already dead, while the Red Gum had the highly contagious root-rotting disease *phelinus noxiu*, and was structurally unsafe. The whole assemblage needed to be removed.

Over the decades the three trees had become home to generations of birds, and the then current nesting occupants were sensitively relocated by council to nesting boxes placed in nearby parks as part of the tree removal process.³

By Saturday 27th February 2016, all that was left of the popular Tewantin landmark was a stump, the tree having been removed piece by piece and burned to reduce the danger of the disease spreading to other trees in the area.
